## From the Desk of the Town Supervisor...

Autumn is upon us and our Highway Department is ready to start picking up loose leaves again this year. I am happy to announce that we are able to continue that important program while cutting its cost by \$10,000. Highway Superintendent, Tom Coppola started a compost program in 2010 that eliminated most of our disposal costs. Please refer to the section in this newsletter regarding the leaf program for more information.

This season also finds us busy with budget development as we enact our 2012 budget this month. A summary of the proposed budget is included in this newsletter. I am proud to note that after many public meetings, input from the Budget and Finance Committee and work by the Board and Department Heads that we're able to deliver a spending plan under the tax cap at a 1.85% increase for all funds. This budget cuts operational spending by about \$150,000 (1.35%) even after we absorbed massive increases on retirement and health insurance costs - each of those is a state mandated benefit that we have no direct control over. This budget saves money in energy costs thanks to new programs that lower our electricity rate, saves \$147,000 in personnel costs due to a hiring freeze, and saves about \$150,000 in health insurance costs thanks to our negotiated labor contracts. Overall, we achieved this with no cut to services and no new fees.

On the economic development front, we continue our progress toward the redevelopment of our commercial corridors and as you will read, the town staff has been very busy preparing for Target and Mohawk Ambulance. We've also recently submitted a plan to the Governor's Economic Development Regional Council that positions the County Airport, The Technology Park, our Town Center and the Freemans Bridge Road area for consideration of investment dollars in Glenville. Recently, we got word that the federal government is ready to prepare the "GSA Buildings" in the Glenville Business and Technology Park (Corp Park) for re-development and we are working closely with state and county officials on that project. Although it seems as though progress is slow, I assure you that it is steady and we remain engaged with developers to grow Glenville. In fact, you'll read about our efforts to market Glenville world-wide.

In this edition, you'll also see a fairly comprehensive report on recent park activity. I have always believed that our parks are a tremendous asset for our town and I am proud of the recent work that will improve them for generations to come. Most notably, I want to thank our community partners for all their help. Recent improvements include a new 5k running trail, a new girls' softball field, and improvements to our boys' first-class baseball fields.

Finally, I would like to thank all those who worked so hard to make our 2nd Annual Oktoberfest such a success. Although the weather was not good, we had a fantastic turn-out and it was another great community event. Mark your calendars for next year. The event will be back on September 29th. In the meantime, our Winterfest will be held on February 4th and we hope to see you there.

I hope you enjoy this edition of our town newsletter and you find it informative and worthwhile. Our goal is to help facilitate communications with and among the community. ## From the Highway Department...

### 2011 FALL LEAF PROGRAM (began October 24, 2011)

- Do not delay; get your leaves out now. The town has begun picking up leaves in early leaf-drop zones, and will make repeated passes through town until winter weather arrives.
- Brush, sticks, rocks, stone & debris may not be mixed in with leaf piles as they cause costly damage to our machines.
- Loose leaves must be placed on the edge of your lawn, no further than 10 ft from the roadside. Please keep in mind that the leaf machine's suction hose is only 10 ft. long.
- Do not fill dead-end streets with leaf piles.
- It is unlawful to place anything on the pavement impeding the roadway and traffic.
- Once snow falls and remains on leaves, all leaves must then be bagged.

### SNOW PLOWING & ICE CONTROL

- Glenville Code §1219 - It is unlawful to throw or deposit snow or ice in the roadway. Do not clean off vehicles in roadways.
- In the event of a heavy wet snow storm, please place garbage cans as far from road's edge as possible to prevent knock-over.
- Placement of basketball hoops or other structures in the town's roadways/right of ways is prohibited and slows down plowing.
- Parking of vehicles is prohibited on town roadways between 3 am and 6 am, from November 15th through April 1st.
- Parking is prohibited on or along town roadways for 48 hours after a snowfall exceeding an average depth of four inches.
- Please report any storm drain issues you have during the winter.
- We do not put snow in your driveway; we plow the roads that your driveway is on.

### CHRISTMAS TREES

We will again offer the Christmas tree pick up program this year.

- Program begins the week of January 1, 2012 and continues for three weeks, weather permitting.
- Trees buried under snow will not be picked up.
- All ornaments, stands and plastic bags must be removed.

## From the Building Department...

### DETECTORS

It's an old message that gets repeated every year but it's still worth repeating - smoke and carbon monoxide detectors save lives! October and daylight savings are the time of year that we think about replacing our batteries, but we should also be checking that our detectors are in the proper location and that they are still serviceable. Over the years, the codes regarding these detectors have been revised to provide better protection, and if your home is less than eight years old you should be in compliance. If your home is older than that, the codes still apply, only you can use battery operated devices.

The code requires a smoke detector to be located on every level of your house, and they should be located near the sleeping areas and are also required to be in every sleeping area. Carbon Monoxide detectors are required to be on every level where you have a sleeping area, an attached garage, or have a carbon monoxide producing appliance. Do not locate these devices directly over the stove, furnace, or water heater because it will result in false alarms. The purpose of these devices is to alert you to a problem, especially if you are sleeping, and allow you to have time to evacuate the house and call 911.

### EMERGENCY RESPONSE

Please make sure that your house number is at least 4" high, and visible from the road. Our first responders are doing their very best to keep us safe; let's not make the job any more difficult by making them search for your house.

### SIGNS, SIGNS, EVERYWHERE A SIGN

Starting next year the Town of Glenville is beginning a review of our sign ordinance and would like your input. We are putting together a survey that businesses and residents of the town can complete and express their opinions. We will include a link on our website that will allow you to respond electronically, and there will also be copies available at the Municipal Center for your convenience. This is an opportunity for you to have input and make a difference in how our town looks.

## From the Assessor's Office...

Property tax exemption applications may be obtained at the Assessor's Office in the Glenville Town Hall, weekdays between 9-5PM or the New York State Office of Real Property Services on the web at <http://www.orps.state.ny.us/star>.

STAR exemptions are for any resident owning property and residing on the property. All owners must complete the application and sign it. We will need a photocopy of all owners' drivers licenses as proof of residency. We may ask for other information such as voter registration or checking account info with name and same address on it to show proof of residency.

We will not accept National Grid or Verizon bills as proof.

If you know of someone who goes to a warmer climate in the winter please remind them to re-apply before they leave or check the status of their application. The amount of income for the Enhanced Senior exemption is \$79,050.

### IMPORTANT DATES

March 1st - All exemptions are due to the Assessor's office.

May 22nd - Grievance Day 9am-9pm. An appointment is required.

August 1st - Deadline for filing Small Claims: 30 days after the Final Roll. Our assessment roll is now posted on the [townofglenville.org](http://townofglenville.org) website for your review. Please be patient as the file is very large to download. For questions, please call 518-688-1200 Ext 403.

## Did you know...?

That Glenville recently took advantage of declining electricity cost to lock in a rate of .0646 cents per kWh through October 2013. The town bid its electricity purchases for a two-year period and entered into agreement with Constellation Energy for a new rate that was 33% less than the previous rate.

## Parks and Open Space Updates

### MAALWYCK PARK

Maalwyck's location on the Mohawk River recently proved to be a double-edged sword, when the usually scenic and tranquil park was transformed into a raging floodway as the remnants of Hurricanes Irene and Lee visited. The soccer fields and surrounding area were completely underwater, but thankfully, park damage was limited to some of Highland Soccer's goals, a muddy storage building, and some silt deposition. The adjacent canal/Lock 8 property didn't fare as well, as the river carved a new 270' channel around the Lock. Although the soccer season was impacted, efforts by Highland Soccer, the Town of Glenville, and excellent cooperation from the Canal Corporation and its contractors, allowed for traditional fall recreational soccer at Maalwyck. Intensive work to restore the riverbank to the best degree possible will continue into December and resume in the spring.

### INDIAN MEADOWS PARK

Plans are underway for expansion of the Girls' Softball field area, with an additional field, badly needed parking, and a new access roadway planned for spring. BH-BL Baseball hosted another state tournament this past summer, and continues to improve this now first-class baseball facility in partnership with the town. And, in yet another joint project with the Glenville Rotary, an Eagle Scout project by Chris Lacoss (nearing completion) expands the trail system in the park to include a 5k running trail that can host cross-country meets, casual day use, and most recently, the park's 1st trail race hosted by the Glenville Rotary. Thank you to all of those who help grow our parks! Plan on x-country skiing or snowshoeing these trails this winter.

### SANDERS PRESERVE

Speaking of Eagle Scout projects, a new bridge has been added to Zone 3 (east of Gower Rd.) in the preserve to allow for safe crossing of a tributary to the Washout Creek. Thanks to Mike Nietfeld for that tremendous effort. Volunteer trail maintenance at Sanders is scheduled for Saturday, November 5th from 8am until noon. ### THE CHRISTIANA OPEN SPACE

The 48-acre parcel on the northwest corner of Droms and Onderdonk Roads, now has a small parking area on Onderdonk Road and an entrance sign. An entrance trail has been roughed in, the Open Space Committee put up boundary signs, and volunteers will continue to improve the trail system in this mixed terrain area. A cross country ski/snowshoe outing there this winter would be a good introduction to the property.

### WINTERFEST

The town's annual Winterfest will be held in Indian Meadows Park on February 4th. It's not too early to mark your calendars.

### BIKE PATH

The Bike Path that runs from Freemans Bridge Road to Washington Avenue is closed until further notice due to the floods. Most significantly, the historic replica Whipple Bridge over the Collins Creek was lifted off its foundation and displaced. The town recently was able to put the bridge back to its proper location through the innovative use of a very heavy duty "tow truck." In cooperation

with the County and Village, surface improvements to the path and correction of drainage under the railroad overpass are needed prior to re-opening.

## Glenridge Road Reconstruction

Work continues on this major east/west corridor between the town and points east. A recent closure and detour caused a bit more delay than was expected, and the traffic signal in place at Maple and Alplaus Avenues will likely remain in place until a permanent light is established by the County in 2012. It is expected that most of the road work will be completed in 2012, including the roundabout at Maple and Glenridge, widening of both railroad underpasses which will eliminate the traffic signal, and a road grade reduction on Glenridge near Bruce Drive. A 72-day closure of Glenridge is expected in 2012, but will not begin until schools go on summer recess. Upon project completion, the significantly improved traffic flow along Glenridge Road is expected to alleviate rush hour congestion and strengthen the town's connection to western Clifton Park.

## Mohawk Ambulance to Open

Mohawk Ambulance will soon be opening a new facility at 176 Freemans Bridge Road, in the former Envy Salon building, next door to the Raindancer Car Wash. Four ambulances will be housed within the station following significant interior renovations to the vacant building. Mohawk pointed to the frequency of ambulance calls and the demographics of Glenville as two reasons for siting a new facility in our town. The new location will cut response times by at least two to three minutes for most areas of Glenville.

## Oktoberfest 2012

Leaden skies and misty rain took their toll on this year's Glenville Oktoberfest, held October 1st at Richmor Aviation and the County Airport. Extensive planning and effort goes into a community event such as Oktoberfest, but the weather is one event that can't be planned for. Despite the occasional rain, attendance was solid, participants had a good time, and Glenville held a great community event. The number of people and organizations that contribute to Oktoberfest are too numerous to thank individually, but in particular the all-volunteer committee and generous sponsors allow this event to occur at no cost to the town or the public attending. THANK YOU to all the businesses and individuals that made this event a success! Next year, a slight change of date for the event is planned - September 29th. See you there.

## Cable TV Update

Residents have recently called the town to ask when Verizon FIOS will be coming. While it's true that Verizon will need to have an agreement with the town in order to deliver "cable TV" services, there is no prohibition to their constructing the fiber optic infrastructure to deliver voice and internet service, and the town welcomes their potential entry into the Glenville market. In order to deliver cable TV service, per federal legislation, Verizon will need to have a franchise agreement with the town, but it will largely mimic the existing Time Warner agreement and does not pose a barrier to their entry into our market. The ball is in Verizon's court. If they wish to build the infrastructure, Glenville would enter into an agreement with Verizon.

The town's discussions with Time Warner continue to try to resolve the disagreement regarding whether Time Warner had the right to pass through to their subscribers a five (5) percent franchise fee when the town's agreement called for a 2% pass through. There is potentially 1.3 million dollars at stake, and the town has engaged the NYS Attorney General's office for assistance. The town is acting as a representative for its cable TV subscribers in this dispute.

## Of Banks and Pizza Places

One of the questions that Town officials hear frequently is "Why did you approve another bank?" We receive similar inquiries and complaints about pizza places, car repair shops and fast food restaurants. Additionally, we often hear public comments asking why the town and its "politicians" don't put a restaurant or a desirable business in a certain location.

The answers to these questions can be found in zoning laws. If the zoning district in which the property is located allows a particular type of use - whether it's a benign use like a bank or something more intense like a big box store - then the owner/developer has the right to build or establish that use. Usually this "right" is subject to site plan review and approval by the Town's Planning and Zoning Commission, a process in which the Commission evaluates and often alters various elements of the project, including parking, landscaping, lighting, drainage, sign installation, etc. The town can shape a project, but it cannot decide whether a project will or will not happen.

Municipalities do not have the authority to dictate the particulars of the marketplace. A Planning Board can't decree, for example, that "we already have too many (fill in the blank) in Town; we're not allowing any more." Such a decision would be arbitrary and capricious, and would not withstand legal challenge.

## Target on target

One of the hottest topics of conversation in Glenville these days is the pending new Target store. By the time this article reaches you, demolition of the vacant K-Mart and Grand Union buildings will either be underway or imminent. The new Target store will consist of 135,000 sq. ft. of floor area. In addition to Target, a 36,000 sq. ft. multi-tenant retail store will be constructed adjacent to Target, resulting in development in excess of 171,000 sq. ft. For reference purposes, the vacant K-Mart and Grand Union were approximately 128,000 sq. ft. Target is aiming for an opening date of October, 2012.

## 2012 Glenville Budget...

Developing this budget has been difficult and filled with hard choices, but balances the need to manage ever-increasing state mandates with protecting core services. It blends the goal of cutting fund balance dependency with the need to craft a solid, sustainable budget for future years. This budget continues our effort to redesign how we staff Town Hall and focuses us on rethinking how we can deliver services to our residents. Most importantly, this budget meets the statutory requirements of the NYS "Tax Cap Law" with a blended levy increase of 1.85% over all of the town's funds.

Although this budget does not call for layoffs, it does not allow for any new hires in positions currently open nor of those that will become open for the next six months. This policy was recently codified in my 6-month hiring freeze mandated to department heads. This will allow us time to reevaluate staffing levels and identify new ways of delivering services and determining which positions need to be changed. Some full time positions will be re-staffed as part time and some positions may be eliminated through attrition. It is my objective to create a Town Hall staff that is cross-trained in multiple departments so that each department gets the support they need, when they need it. Currently, we operate in silos and staff to each department's peak needs; that can no longer continue. I envision a staff that can easily float between where the needs are, thereby allowing us to continue our stellar service to the resident but in a more efficient manner.

Overall, this budget continues to the work that this Board started 22 months ago to reshape town government, make it more efficient, and more sustainable for future years. The policy enacted in this budget is necessary for the town to move forward and continue to provide a government that is responsive and affordable.

### OUR CORE OBJECTIVES:

This budget was crafted with the following objectives:

- Meet the Terms of the Tax Cap Legislation
- Protect Core Services
- Reduce Our Dependency on Fund Balance Allocations
- Continue Investment in Infrastructure Improvements and Economic Development

### WHAT WE HAVE DONE TO CUT SPENDING

This budget cut net operational spending by nearly \$150,000 (1.35%), which continues the trend from the prior year when we cut non-state-mandated spending by about \$200,000 through staff reductions. It's important to note that these net cuts are in contrast to runaway expense growth in state-mandated lines such as health insurance (10%) and pension costs (3.5%). There was also a 2% growth in contractual pay increases that were agreed to in early 2011 before the tax cap was implemented in July. Although it is becoming more difficult to make spending cuts to a budget that is comprised of about 65% percent personnel costs, this year we made some difficult decisions that were designed to spread the cuts out yet protect core services. Among the more significant cuts:

- \$147,000 in personnel, achieved by placing a hiring freeze on all open positions.
- Cut non-town run programs by \$12,000.
- Cut leaf pickup costs by \$10,000 while protecting the program.
- Cut \$76,000 to the Highway's paving, fuel and equipment line.
- Cut \$3,000 in energy costs due to the town's solar program and have a potential for additional \$70,000 in savings due to a newly negotiated contract for lower electricity rates.
- Cut about \$150,000 in health insurance costs due in part to the unions' concessions on their health insurance benefits.
- Reduced positions by 3 full-time and 2 part-time.
- Reduced overtime expenses by \$10,000.

### WHY WE NEED TO BREAK OUR DEPENDENCY ON FUND BALANCE ALLOCATIONS

For too long, this town has relied on allocating its fund balance to cover

operational expenses - this is akin to using your savings account to pay your mortgage because you don't have the money to pay it from earned income. Over the years, this dependency grew to over \$1.3 million. Last year, the board reduced fund balance use by \$200,000 (15%) to about \$1.1 million.

This year, we made significant progress toward reducing our dependency by reducing it by \$351,500 (32%) to \$800,000.

This budget also continues the important work in our Economic Development and Planning Department by investing in the REDI program, which was very successful in 2011 with a sign replacement program, and again necessary for 2012. The best way to increase new revenue is to continue our economic development success that encourages more businesses to open up in Glenville. This upcoming year we will see Target open, adding to the recent additions of Key Bank, Game Stop, Mohawk Honda, and Mohawk Ambulance, to name a few. Our town's commitment to economic development through the REDI Fund signals to businesses everywhere that Glenville is open and ready for business. As I have shared before, one of the issues that faces the Glenville property owner is that too much of the tax levy is placed on the back of the resident because we do not have the commercial base that our surrounding towns have - that has to change in order to mitigate the tax burden on our residents.

### CONCLUSION

Many of you have seen the diagram of the dollar bill that shows only about 8% of your total annual property taxes goes to the town. 92% of your tax bill goes to the county and school district. That said, we take seriously the burden any tax places on you and understand the difficulty in any tax increase. The average home in Glenville will see about a \$5 increase in their town tax bill for every 1% the levy is increased. The average tax bill for 2011 resulted in \$553 to the town, \$1,215 to the county, and \$3,527 to the school district.

I am proud of the progress we have made in the town: 2 years in a row of decreased operational costs outside of state-mandated increases, new employment contracts with the town's unions that helped us achieve savings in our health insurance line, the on-going redesign of staffing to gain efficiencies, the pattern of cutting our dependency on fund balance, the dramatic cuts to our energy costs and the reduction our debt by \$135,000 this year. This, along with our increased investment in economic development and the town's infrastructure, provides us the ability to manage this crisis well into the future.

### Economic Development

Glenville continues to consider economic development its highest day-to-day priority. To that end: 1. Supervisor Koetzle sent a letter to the Governor's Regional Economic Development Council in October that highlighted four opportunities for potential investment - The Schenectady County Airport/Richmor Aviation, the Glenville Business and Technology Park (Corporations/Industrial Parks), the Freemans Bridge Road Corridor, and Glenville Town Center. The town is positioning itself for future growth that will result from Global Foundries, the GE Battery Plant, or any related development that may occur. The first step is getting Glenville's opportunities and assets known by the decision makers. 2. Glenville recently developed (in-house) an effective marketing flier that we and others are using to market Glenville nationally and internationally. Glenville's membership in the Center for Economic Growth (CEG) allows them to spotlight Glenville while they market the Capital Region, and SBED members have recently promoted Glenville in Dresden, Germany at the Semicon Europa trade show and at Semicon West in San Francisco. The flier stresses Glenville's many assets and opportunities for business sector growth in a community with a great quality of life. 3. Glenville will host a community forum on November 15th entitled, Opportunity Knocks, that will provide information on what Global Foundries and the high tech growth in the area might mean for Glenville. Details will be finalized shortly and publicized. This forum is for everyone in our community - Students, Businesses, Homeowners and more will be affected by these new industries in our region, and preparing Glenville for such growth starts with knowledge. Don't miss it!
